Introduction

Wave III Tobacco Tax Data file supplements the County Health and Mobility database available for Waves I & IV. Comprehensively, these data files provide tobacco tax for Add Health respondent state of residence from Wave I to Wave IV.

Data

Tobacco tax information, assembled in Orzechowski and Walker’s annual compendium, is measured at the state level. Data were matched to the state that the Add Health respondent was living in at the time of the Wave III interview. Data were matched to respondents so as to ensure that these contextual variables correspond as closely as possible to the year in which the Add Health respondents were interviewed at Wave III (2001).

Tax Burden on Tobacco
