SPRING MEETING APRIL 11-12

The 1987 Spring Meeting of the Archaeological Society of North Carolina will coincide with the 50th anniversary celebration of archaeological work at Town Creek Indian Mound. Several outstanding speakers and slide presentations are scheduled for Saturday, April 11, at the Sheraton Inn in Southern Pines. An additional event will be held on Sunday, April 12, at Town Creek Indian Hound. Although we will not have the opportunity to hold a regular business meeting, no one will want to miss this program. A letter from the North Carolina Department of Cultural Resources concerning the weekend's activities, and a registration form, are provided at the back of this Newsletter.

SUMMARY OF FALL MEETING

The 1986 ASNC Fall Meeting was held at Town Creek Indian Mound and was attended by over 60 people. Several society members exhibited artifacts from their personal collections. Randy Daniel, an anthropology graduate student at UNC-CH, talked and showed slides of a Paleo-Indian site--Harney Flats--excavated near Tampa, Florida. The site is important because of its excellent stratigraphy and an abundance of stone tools. Archaeologists gathered valuable information about Paleo-Indian tool kits and the manufacturing sequence for projectile points and other tools.

Dr. Allen May of the Schiele Museum spoke about the Gaston County Archaeological Project. Volunteers and help from the Gaston County Archaeological Society were instrumental in discovering 30 new sites and helped excavate sites which may be at the boundary of two different Woodland cultures.

David Fuerst, also an anthropology graduate student at UNC-CH, spoke and showed slides of an archaeological excavation at Fort Scammon, an earthen Civil War fortification built by the 23rd Ohio Regiment in 1863. The excavation revealed many details about the fort's construction as well as several artifacts from the period.

Finally, Dr. Steve Davis from the Research Laboratories of Anthropology at UNC-CH gave a talk and slide presentation about the now

completely excavated site of Occaneechi Town near Hillsborough.
Occaneechi was a Siouan village that traded with early European
settlements in Virginia. This work, funded by the National Geographic
Society, is part of a larger study being conducted by the Research Labs
to study culture change among Piedmont Siouans during the Historic
period. ASNC volunteers were able to provide assistance during several
phases of the excavation.


