Each date description indicates the seminar topic and location, as well as any readings or assignments. All readings and audio should be completed by the date on which they are listed. Please ensure that you take notes on your readings/audio and reflect on how they connect your work/organization, as that will make for a richer discussion in our seminars. If it appears that you all are not completing the readings/audio, I will assign weekly writing assignments. In order to best learn from one another, we each need to pull our weight and contribute!

Some of the assignments require discussions with your supervisors. Please ensure that you keep all of the information that you collect on your organization throughout the summer, as you might need it later on. Note that, aside from the assignments that require a conversation with your supervisor, your work is to be finished outside of your internship time.

In addition, you will each help to lead one of our seminar sessions! On the date that we collaborate with your host site, I would like for you to collaborate with your supervisor(s) and co-intern to help educate the cohort and guide our discussion.

Finally, you will work together to complete a creative final project that will encapsulate your individual and group experiences over the summer. We will talk more about what this might look like.

Part of what distinguishes The Moxie Project from an individual internship is the cohort model and the weekly seminars. In order to get the most out of your experience this summer, please take advantage of these things! I hope that you will grow together as a team. Assignments Due:

- Arrive on time and work out expectations with your site supervisor.
- Check with supervisor about any upcoming major events that they will want you to attend.
- Have a conversation with supervisor about your organization's mission, how that mission evolved, and how your work will contribute to that mission.
- Bring to Friday's seminar a written work plan, which both you and your supervisor sign, that outlines your major projects and any deliverables and due dates for the summer.

Assignments Due:

- Ask your internship supervisor for a copy of the agency's budget and/or annual report. Talk with your supervisor or others in the agency to find out the percentage of the budget that supports personnel, the average salary or salary structure for employees, the various sources of funding (grants, donations, revenue from services, etc.), who is responsible for raising funds, what changes have occurred to the budget over the last 5-10 years (increases, decreases, and reasons for them), and how those changes affected the organization.
- Ask your internship supervisor about the history of the agency how it began, by whom, when, why, etc. Record your findings and be prepared to share what you've learned during the Friday seminar. Think back to last week's discussion-at what stage of growth is your organization?
- Bring your written work plan (see above) to seminar!
