MISSION STATEMENT:

The purpose of this society shall be to bring together persons interested in the history of Southport and surrounding areas. We endeavor to provide programs of historical interest at regular meetings, publish articles and books for the purpose of education and encourage community participation in the preservation of our heritage.

Southport Historical Society was established January 1976 and maintains the Old Jail Museum and the Susie S Carson Research Room in the Garrison.

If you haven't been to the Visitors' Center lately, I strongly recommend that you go and see what the Southport Historical Society (SHS) is doing to educate the public by displaying the written and visual history of Southport before most of us moved here.

We now have the space and flexibility in our display room to co-operate with the city of Southport when opportunities arise to share local history with visitors and residents. At the present, we are displaying the original red storefront of Fullwood's grocery that was a prominent part of the business district from the 1940's - 1960's. The old cash register with its paper tape roll and sectioned till fascinates computer generations. We are very pleased to be able to accommodate the over-flow of framed paintings of Southport scenes from the mid to late 1900's by the late Art Newton whose skilled hand and perceptive artistic eye have captured the Southport he knew while living here.

We also display a 192-year old letter of advice from Joshua Potts to his ten-year old son, Robert James, who was going to Halifax County, North Carolina to live with his sister, Sarah, and her husband, Willis Alston. That letter seems to be the only original document in Southport with the signature of Joshua Potts, founder of Smithville and one of the town's first commissioners appointed by the state legislature. It was acquired through an auction house in New York City that contacted the SHS about the sale to which we eagerly responded.

The Susie Sellers Carson Research Room is filled with file cabinets of her private collection. Also there are shelves of books accumulated by the SHS since its inception. Although it has taken decades, the SHS finally has a place that increases one's opportunity to learn more about Southport's history as well as delve into their own family history. If you want access to the room contact Bob Surridge at (570) 899-2525. He is also looking for volunteers to continue cataloging the files. Bill Johnson, our archivist, helps people research their local ancestors and the house plaques.

Go see for yourself how we are making our presence known at the Visitors' Center and Museum located in the Ft. Johnston Garrison house.

PROGRAMS SLATED FOR 2014-2015

HISTORIC HOUSE PLAQUE

The Historical Society's Historical Plaque program has been quite active since January of this year. With each new application I find myself meeting Southport's home and property owners from years gone by. I become quite happy when I uncover an interesting story, which I seem to have missed in the short time, I have been studying the history of my new hometown.

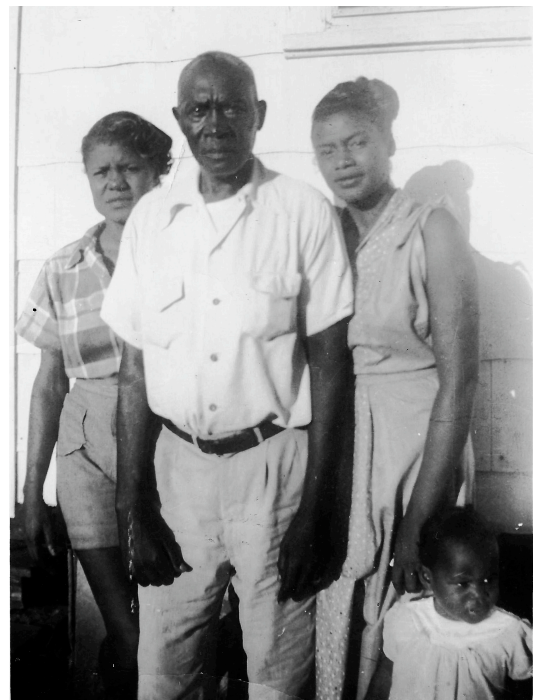
Early in March of this year the Society received a request for a house plaque, for a home on West St. George Street. Ms. Isabelle Anderson made the request for Fred Moore, her grandfather's house. Fred Moore was the second owner of the property and the first owner of the house that he built.

I found Ms. Anderson's home a charming example of a bygone time in Southport's history. The Fred Moore House is well cared for and exemplifies cottages built in Southport during the 1920's. Ms. Anderson told me some of the history of the house and how it rode-out Hurricane Hazel in 1954. Ms. Anderson wanted the plaque to read "Fred Moore House" and we determined that the property date should be "Circa 1920". Isabelle Anderson was quiet gratuitous when I called her to say that the application had been approved and what legend would be placed on the plaque.

One of the things that I found most helpful in Miss Anderson's documentation of the property ownership transfers was the fact that her documents included not only the locations of the property lines but also the name of the owners of the adjacent properties. Finding information about a house (building) is the most difficult part in qualifying for a plaque. Deeds of property mention the land but very rarely the house. When I looked at the 1920 census record I found Mr. Fred Moore and also confirmation that the names on the deed transfers matched those on the census.

Ms. Anderson was able to include a photo of Fred Moore (her grandfather), her mother Mary Moore Anderson on the right, and her aunt "Chippie" Swain-on the left with her cousin, Mary Davis (little girl). They are standing on the side of the house----picture taken circa 1940.

If you are wondering if your house qualifies for a plaque, the application is on the Society's website with information needed to have your house qualified.
