Re: Report for the November 16 meeting

This fall has flown by, the fiscal year is already one-third over, and lots of good things are under way; thus, my report is a bit longer than usual.

Net sales through the end of October are right on projection at \$2.2 million (42% of our goal), with returns running about 15% lower than forecast. (Returns started early last year and continued above forecast for the entire year; we are hopeful that with a lot of inventory pruned down during FY11, returns will run at a more normal rate.) For the first quarter of FY12, our sales results track closely with our AAUP peers, as do our returns numbers.

Our e-book sales—and especially Kindle sales—continue to grow, reflecting both a greater number of Press titles available in one or more e-formats (and our effectiveness in getting that word out), as well as the increasing popularity of e-books.

Since the Board last met, we've had lots of award news.

- 17 books were named by CHOICE as Outstanding Academic Books of 2011—this is an all-time high for UNC Press. (In January, when the full list is published, we'll compare this record against other university presses.)

In print attention, we have had book reviews in *Ceramics Monthly, The New York Review of Books, Bon Appétit, Newsweek, Sea History,* the *Latin American Herald Tribune, Civil War Times, Savannah Morning News,* the *Portland Oregonian, Mobile Press-Register,* the *Women's Review of Books,* the *Times (London) Literary Supplement, Choice, Library Journal, Edible Piedmont,* and many others. We expect a review shortly in the *Wall St. Journal* (Walker, ACC BASKETBALL). And the food blogs and online publications are loving our three recent cookbooks—from Epicurious.com to Zagat.com to the *L.A. Times Weekly Online.* In an era of shrinking print reviews, I think we've done a very good job of adding broadcast and online attention, much of it niche-directed.

Work on the Strategic Plan is proceeding apace, with a managers' lunch scheduled for Nov. 10 to discuss departmental benchmarks for FY13-15.

To give you a sense of what else the past several months have included, I can report that Vicky Wells represented the Press once again at the Frankfurt Book Fair, selling rights, arranging translation deals, and looking for co-publishing partners; Gina and Elaine went to the Southern Foodways Alliance to talk with authors, prospective authors, agents, and food writers. Sales and Publicity staff were at the Southern Festival of Books in Nashville with our regional trade books. And there are lots of local author events going on.

We have had a number of conference calls and, last week, a small faculty focus group meeting here on campus with representatives from JSTOR to talk about the planned aggregation of Books at JSTOR. Work on this continues at a feverish pace.

And the editors have been on the road to the Ethnohistory, American Studies, Western History, Southern History, and Legal History meetings; Elaine leaves right after the Board meeting for the American Academy of Religion meeting.

We have launched our new Southern Gateways website (and accompanying catalog)--if you haven't yet looked at it, I hope you will. Our holiday sale is underway. And, in the wink of an eye, work will begin for the January launch meeting for our fall 12 list.

To top it off, we have celebrated along with Sian Hunter and our author Tiya Miles, who recently won a MacArthur ("genius") Award. Tiya says her UNC Press book THE HOUSE ON DIAMOND HILL was the reason she won. It just doesn't get much better than that!
