#### <u>2019 United Tribes Scholarship Awards</u>

United Tribes of North Carolina believes in promoting educational opportunities for American Indian Students. Since the creation of the United Tribes Scholarship Award, over \$100,000 has been awarded to deserving students pursuing higher education degrees. We are proud to continue this worthwhile tradition. The submission deadline is Monday, February 25, 2019.

The instructions for applicants are as follows:

- Applicants must be American Indian residing in North Carolina and enrolled in a state or federally recognized tribe.
- Applicant must be an incoming freshman enrolling in a two year or four year college or university, and/or freshman, sophomores, juniors or seniors who are enrolled and still attending a two-year or four-year college or university.
- Applicants must be enrolled as full-time students.
- Only completed applications will be accepted for consideration. Incomplete applications will not be accepted.
- Applicants must apply for all other sources of funding for which they are eligible. Applications will be competitive. We expect to
  award five \$500.00 scholarships for Fall 2019.
- The screening committee will use a point system to score the applications on academic achievement, grade point average, career plans, American Indian activities, extracurricular activities, community involvement, references and essay.
- Winners will be announced Saturday, March 9, 2019 during the morning General Assembly at the 44th Annual North Carolina Indian Unity Conference at the North Raleigh Hilton (3415 Wake Forest Road Raleigh, NC 27609).
- A student who has received the United Tribes Scholarship once will not be eligible to receive it again in any category.
- Applications must be received by 5:00 p.m. on Monday, February 25, 2019.

### Christian Buffaloe to compete in Elite Japanese Martial Arts Event in Los Angeles

Local Kyokushin Karate fighter Christian Buffaloe is scheduled to compete in the Japan sponsored "2019 Kyokushin Karate USWC Championships" in Los Angeles, California on January 27th. This elite championships features top level Kyokushin Karate full contact competitors from Japan, Russia, Eastern Europe, Australia, South America, and Canada. This year's event will also serve as a qualifying tournament for entry into the "12th World Kyokushin Karate Championships" in Tokyo, Japan in November, 2019. The top 3 winners of the Los Angeles tournament will be able to compete in the World Championships against the best fighters over a 3 day period in Japan. The OLYMPICS will be held in Tokyo in 2020 and Karate will be included for the first time at this world event.

Christian Buffaloe is training hard under his instructor, Kenny Buffaloe to prepare for this great opportunity. Buffaloe is a 7 time Kyokushin youth/teen champion and also an amateur Muay-Thai Kickboxing champion. This will be his first time to compete in this event as an adult competitor in the Men's division. Buffaloe is very appreciative of the support and encouragement he has received and promises to do his best to represent the USA and North Carolina at this prestigious event. The "2019 Kyokushin Karate USWC Championships" will be covered by FUJI-TV, Japan's number #1 cable television network and later released on DVD. In addition to competing in these championship tournaments, Christian Buffaloe also helps teach local youth in the Kyokushin Karate classes in Roanoke Rapids and Murfreesboro. He
