Copyright law is complex. Now, thanks to the Internet, the way libraries apply copyright law has never been more perplexing. What you will learn from this program:

- How do fair use and intellectual property law apply in a library setting?
- When is it necessary to restrict your patrons' access to Internet-based resources and why?
- What are the liabilities of libraries, librarians, and patrons for copyright violations?
- What is "fair use" in the digital age?
- When is it necessary to seek permission from copyright holders to use Internet materials? When is it not necessary?
- How does licensing access to Internet materials affect fair use?
- How are patrons' rights affected when a library licenses electronic products rather than purchases print materials?
- What is the Digital Millenium Copyright Act (DMCA) and how does it change the way your library has been operating?
- What impact is the Sonny Bono Copyright Extension Act having on libraries?
- Must electronic reserves be password-protected to preserve a claim to fair use?

-- How long can a journal article be made available through e-reserves for distance education?

The panelists, including UNC's Laura N. Gasaway, are top experts on copyright law in electronic environments. Lolly Gasaway is an attorney, a librarian, a professor, and a frequent writer and speaker on copyright issues. As a professor of law and director of the law library at UNC, she teaches courses on intellectual property, cyberspace law, and law librarianship and legal resources. She writes the "Copyright Corner" for SLA's *Information Outlook* and also has a copyright column in *Against the Grain*. Prior to coming to Chapel Hill, she was director of the law library at the University of Oklahoma from 1975-84 and at the University of Houston from 1973-75.

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#### CBT TIP: MICROSOFT OFFICE 2000: NEW FEATURES FOR POWER USERS

The tip below can be found in the "Microsoft Office 2000: New Features for Power Users" online CBT course. To access this CBT course, go to <http://help.unc.edu/cbt/curricula/courses/msof02e/msof02e.htm>

Microsoft PowerPoint 2000 presentation tool allows users to give presentations and to collaborate on them across the Web. PowerPoint 2000 integrates NetShow and NetMeeting technologies so that you can collaborate live over a network. You can collaborate while you are creating a presentation or while you are presenting it. In order to collaborate with someone else on a presentation you must:

1. Select Online Collaboration - Meet Now option from the Tools menu.
2. In the "Place a Call" dialog box, select the computer with which you want to collaborate, and click the "Call" button.
3. The "Online Meeting" dialog box confirms your connection and provides collaboration tools.
4. Click the "Allow Others to Edit" button on the "Online Meeting" dialog box to give someone access to the PowerPoint presentation.
5. You will be notified that you are allowing others to access your document. Click OK to allow others to edit the presentation.
6. From other users' computers, they may add text or edit other attributes.
7. When the other user is finished editing, click the "End Meeting" button and "Yes" to confirm.
8. Now the modifications made by other users will appear in your presentation.

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#### ITRC TIP: OUTLINING LARGE DOCUMENTS IN WORD 97

The Outline View in Word 97 is a feature that is well-suited to the academic community. Grant Proposals, theses, and dissertations can all be viewed easily using Word's Outline View. Outline View shows the document's structure and makes it easy for you to plan your work. The indentations and symbols in outline view do not affect the way your document looks in normal view and do not print.

With Outline View, you can quickly restructure a document. A gray line under a heading means that the heading includes collapsed, or hidden, subordinate headings or body text. You can reorder headings and text by moving them up or down in outline view, or you can "promote" or "demote" body text or a heading to a higher or lower level.

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#### ITRC TIP: HOW TO SCHEDULE LIVEUPDATE IN NORTON ANTIVIRUS V. 5

Symantec releases new virus definitions each week. Why not configure Norton AntiVirus v. 5 to automatically update your definitions? In Windows 98, Norton AntiVirus uses the new Windows Scheduled Tasks facility to schedule scans and virus updates. Windows 95 uses the Norton Scheduler. The procedures differ slightly between Win 95 and 98, so Bryan Ayers has prepared a hybrid procedure below.

Here's the procedure for Win 9x:

1. Click on Start button.
2. Select Programs.
3. Select Norton Antivirus.

4. Select Schedule a Scan or Live Update (or Norton Program Scheduler in Win95).
5. Double click on Run LiveUpdate (for Norton Antivirus).
6. Click the Schedule Tab (in Win 98).
7. Set the frequency and time you want Live Update to run.
8. Click Apply, then OK.

LiveUpdate supports incremental updates so you only need to download the new virus definition files. Time invested in keeping your virus definitions current is time well spent. Questions or comments? Please send them to [Bryan Ayers@unc.edu](mailto:Bryan_Ayers@unc.edu)
