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### CAMPUS ELECTRONICS RECYCLING PROGRAMS

The disposal of cathode ray tubes (CRTs), found in most TVs and computer monitors, is prohibited (except by households) in North Carolina. The NC Division of Pollution Prevention and Environmental Assistance is encouraging the recycling of all surplus or discarded electronic equipment. Our campus has the following electronics recycling programs in place:

#### Computer Equipment

UNC-Chapel Hill computer equipment, including monitors, keyboards, and printers, should not be placed in the trash. Computer equipment contains lead and mercury and can contaminate soil and water. All UNC-Chapel Hill computer equipment that is no longer wanted (including non-working equipment) should be taken to UNC-Chapel Hill Surplus Property. The computer equipment will then be sold at the campus surplus store or sent to State Surplus property in Raleigh. Working computer equipment is sold through State Surplus Property, and non-working equipment is repaired for use in North Carolina schools. Computer equipment that can not be repaired is recycled.

#### Circuit Board

UNC-Chapel Hill has a program to recycle electronic circuit boards, token ring cards, etc. The boards are disassembled, crushed, and melted by a metals recycler to recover lead and other metals. Due to the high lead content of solder used on electronic boards, the boards are not acceptable for disposal in landfills.

We do not currently have a program for the collection and recycling of cellular phones.

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#### IBIBLIO CELEBRATES ITS 12TH BIRTHDAY

ibiblio (<http://www.ibiblio.org/>), the public's library and digital archive, celebrates its 12th birthday in the month of October. ibiblio, a collaboration between the University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill and the Center for the Public Domain, has served as a vehicle for knowledge sharing since 1992, first as an original Sun Microsystems SunSITE, then as Metalab, finally resting on the ibiblio name in 2000. ibiblio is a free and vibrant exchange of ideas among a large community of contributors who share their knowledge across disciplines. It is one of the major distribution hubs for Linux software and has been a significant supporter of Linux development efforts since its inception.

During the month of October the main ibiblio page will feature links to some of the longest-lived collections, including Project Gutenberg, the Web Museum, Roger McGuinn's Folkden and many others.

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#### SILS AND IBIBLIO RECEIVE GRANT TO DIGITIZE DOCUMENTARY FILMS

The School of Information and Library Science, in partnership with Folkstreams Inc. and ibiblio.org, has received a \$95,113 National Leadership Grant from the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) to digitize documentary films on American folk culture. The grant will allow for global access to the films via the Folkstreams.net website. The films will be transferred from 16 mm film to Digital Betacam and, along with the videotapes and digital copies, will be preserved in UNC-Chapel Hill's Southern Folklife Collection. A multimedia website demonstration highlighting the skills required for transfers from 16 mm film to digital formats will be created.
