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### ACCESSIBLE ELECTRONIC CONTENT WORKSHOP

You are invited to attend a special campus workshop on creating web-based and other electronic content for learners with disabilities.

Accessible Electronic Content: Designing with a Learner's Perspective Friday, May 2, 2003

The goal of the workshop is 1) to increase understanding about the challenges that students with disabilities encounter when working with electronic content and 2) to help develop expertise among the faculty and staff who have key roles supporting electronic content development within their departments.

If you attended the 2001 web accessibility workshop, you may wonder if you should attend this event. Although both workshops were designed to raise awareness of web accessibility issues, we now have more answers and a larger set of tools than we had a couple of years ago. We've been able to expand what we know about handling multimedia materials and have done a great deal of in-depth evaluation of UNC-Chapel Hill materials since the earlier workshop.

Some of specific differences in this year's workshop:

- it will cover current and proposed UNC-Chapel Hill policy and support resources
- it will have a visually-impaired student demonstrate what it is like to use assistive technology to access UNC-Chapel Hill websites and online course materials
- it will focus on some of the chief issues that concern the developer (either faculty or staff).

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## APRIL CONSIDERIT PRESENTATION ON PEER INSTRUCTION

Traditional assignments, such as written reports, are products or evidence of learning that limits the exchange of information to the student and the instructor. These assignments may not promote peer instruction and may not offer an opportunity for cooperative learning, which adult learners favor. This presentation will give several examples of how traditional assignments in two theory courses were converted to digital assignments on Blackboard to insure MSW students had the opportunity for peer instruction and cooperative learning.

### Blackboard 6: What Is New

This course focuses on becoming familiar with Blackboard 6.0's new features and is recommended for any instructor currently using Blackboard 5.5.1. Topics covered will include: easier ways to manage your course content, new customizing options, a new assignment tool to replace the digital dropbox, and improvements in the assessment and gradebook area. The format will be presentation followed by extensive time for hands-on practice with instructor guidance.

Introduction to Blackboard 5.5 For instructors, teaching assistants, and IT support staff with no prior Blackboard experience, this course should be taken before "Blackboard 6: What Is New." It focuses on the basics of 1) posting content to Blackboard sites, 2) using Blackboard's communication tools, 3) customizing sites, and 4) controlling access to them. Blackboard's strengths and limitations as a courseware platform will also be discussed. Attendees are encouraged to bring their course materials with them on disk.

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## ITRC TIP: DIRECT WINDOWS XP EXPLORER TO A SPECIFIC FOLDER

Have you ever wanted a specific folder to open whenever you launched Windows Explorer? Well, you can configure your Windows XP computer to do just that with a specially-configured shortcut and a couple of Windows Explorer's command-line parameters.

For example, suppose that you want Windows Explorer to automatically open a folder called Downloads, which is located in the root directory of drive D. Follow these steps:

1. Right-click the desktop and select New and then click on Shortcut.
2. When the Create Shortcut wizard appears, click the Browse button.
3. Locate and open the Windows folder (usually on drive C) and select Explorer.exe. Click OK.
4. Position your cursor at the end of the command line, press [Spacebar], and type the parameters /e, d:\Downloads
5. Click Next, give the shortcut a name, and select Finish.

Now when you click on that shortcut, it defaults to the folder you specified.
